FROM THE RABBI...



Hi Everyone.

There was a mutiny at services last Thursday morning. The weekly Torah portion describes the importance of keeping your solemn vows. If you are a man. If you are a woman, however, your vow is only valid if your husband affirms it. The Torah gives a husband the absolute right to void any of his wife's vows.

As you might imagine, there was a spontaneous uproar from virtually all of the women present. My luck, it was a particularly well attended service.

Despite my valiant attempts to put some kind of positive spin on this—the importance of inviolable oral

vows to a semi-literate society, or, isn't it wonderful that the Torah provides a mechanism to annul vows that may have been rashly made or were perhaps coerced or manipulated?—the fact remains that this passage is undeniably sexist.

So what do we do about this? For me, ignoring passages such as these is not an option. So long as we venerate our Torah scroll—insist that it be written on parchment with the traditional goose quill pen and ink, cover it with beautifully embroidered velvet and adorn it with silver crowns, parade it at Kol Nidre, and dance with it on Simchat Torah—we have, in my opinion, a responsibility to thoroughly examine its contents. (And let's not forget that the more Orthodox segments of our Jewish society, whom we rightly admire for their commitment to tradition and their success in transmitting their values to their children, do so at the cost of relegating their women to subservient and, to me, demeaning roles, sourced, in part, on Torah passages such as these.)

So, I point out that the Torah is a very old document. That women's rights are a very new idea in Western society. That, for its time, the Torah is often very progressive. In this case, it is likely that in ancient societies women's vows were not to be taken seriously at all. Also, the right the Torah gives the husband to void his wife's vows is very circumscribed. He must annul the vow on the day he is told of it or he forfeits his right. The lesson then is, just as the Torah is at the leading edge of women's rights for its time, we need to be at the forefront of women's rights for our time.

Still, passages like these are a very hard pill for women to swallow. I was even concerned that perhaps our community had been irreparably damaged.

But then, we opened the Ark, chanted the prayer, and paraded the Torah around the chapel. Each of the women took a corner of their tallit, a ritual garment which was, until recently, only worn by men, and lovingly kissed the Torah.

Phew.

Summer is half over, but we still have many great programs. Did you get to the Olstein's for Shabbat on the Lake? It was a cloudy morning, but the sun finally came through. There's nothing like celebrating Shabbat on the lake...outdoors...nature...looking out at Taylor Pond. Don't forget we have Rosh Chodesh at Berth's cottage and Havdallah at the Faiman's...both on Taylor Pond. Both cottages are on the east shore, so you will see beautiful sunsets. As many of you know, we have started the first phase of bringing the cemetery up to higher standards. We are starting with the section to the right as you walk into the Beth Jacob cemetery. We

are scraping off the old grass, adding soil and seeding. This is a multi-phase project and will take a couple of years to complete. When you have a chance, take a ride to the cemetery and let us know your thoughts. Scott Nussinow has been leading this effort and is doing a great job. Thank you, Scott!

It is now time for the Second Annual Dollar-A-Day to begin. Last year's Dollar-A-Day was a great success with many people contributing who have not contributed in the past. With Dollar-A-Day you commit to donating just one dollar every day to the Temple. Now, just about everyone in our community can afford a single dollar a day. Maybe skip a couple of cups of Starbucks coffee...maybe just use the change that accumulates in your pocket at the end of the day. Last year we had 31 families participate in Dollar-A-Day. Our goal this year is 50. (Temple Shalom has about 90 member units that includes families, couples and singles.)

To join Dollar-A-Day, just call or email me (<u>David@AllenMfgUSA.com</u> or 207-333-3385) or Julie (<u>Temple6359@AOL.com</u> or 207-786-4201). You can pay daily, monthly or all in one lump sum. For this, we can even take credit cards. (Keep in mind, we pay the credit card company 3%. So if you pay \$100 by credit card, the Temple only gets \$97.)

Why should everyone participate in Dollar-A-Day? Running the Temple costs money. If you want a Temple or if you use the Temple just a couple of times a year, maybe just for High Holidays or Yahrzeit or just to have a rabbi for a funeral, then it is your responsibility to help out as much as you can. Can you really say that you cannot afford a single dollar every day? Can you really tell yourself that it is not MY responsibility? Can you really just let someone else support the Temple?

Over the past year, we raised enough money to not pull any money out of our investments... nothing...not principle, interest or growth...for the first time in over 25 years. This is a great achievement and it is thanks to all of you for supporting the Temple. However, to make sure we continue on the road to financial stability, we need to continue to raise money. Your one dollar a day helps us reach that goal.

Again, last year we had 31 families participate. This year our goal is 50. Will you help? Will you do your part? Will you support Jewish life in Central Maine?

Summer is here. A great time to relax and read a good book like *As Close To Us As Breathing*. Gathering on July 10 was Bertha Bodenheimer, Adele Silverman, Helene Perry, Sandy Traister and me, Lesli Weiner. The author, Elizabeth Poliner, who teaches creative writing, had us all hooked as the story opens with the death of Davey, the youngest member of this

family saga. She reveals the details throughout the novel, along with how the extended family members deal with their grief and guilt. Yes, read this book!

Our next book comes highly recommended, so I can't wait to start it. *The One Man* is by Andrew Gross who is a bestselling writer of thrillers, plus has coauthored 5 number one bestsellers with James Patterson. *The One Man* is a haunting tale of WWII, and while it's fiction, I am told it really had the feeling of a true story. Here is the book description: "Poland. 1944. Alfred Mendl and his family are brought on a crowded train to a Nazi concentration camp after being caught trying to flee Paris with forged papers. His family is torn away from him on arrival, his life's work burned before his eyes. To the guards, he is just another prisoner, but in fact Mendl—a renowned physicist—holds knowledge that only two people in the world possess. And the other is already at work for the Nazi war machine.

Four thousand miles away, in Washington, DC, Intelligence lieutenant Nathan Blum routinely decodes messages from occupied Poland. Having escaped the Krakow ghetto as a teenager after the Nazis executed his family, Nathan longs to do more for his new country in the war. But never did he expect the proposal he receives from "Wild" Bill Donovan, head of the OSS: to sneak into the most guarded place on earth, a living hell, on a mission to find and escape with one man, the one man the Allies believe can ensure them victory in the war.
