## FROM THE RABBI



Professor Yuval Noah Harari is one of contemporary Israel's brightest stars. He is a historian, philosopher, and the bestselling author of *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind*. His books have sold 45 million copies in 65 languages, and he is considered one of the world's most influential public intellectuals today.

Born in Israel in 1976, Harari received his PhD from the University of Oxford in 2002 and is currently a lecturer at the Department of History at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Yuval Noah Harari lectures around the world on the topics explored in his books and offers his

knowledge and time to various audiences on a voluntary basis. He writes articles for publications such as The Guardian, The Financial Times, The New York Times, TIME, and The Economist.

Professor Harari recently issued the following public statement about the proposed judicial reforms in Israel to the American (and American-Jewish) community asking us to stand with those in Israel fighting to protect Israel's democracy:

As a proud citizen of Israel, I am deeply concerned that my government is trying to establish a dictatorship.

Many dictatorships in history were established not by tanks firing in the streets, but by signing papers behind closed doors. By the time people understood what was happening, it was too late to resist.

To understand what is happening in Israel, you need to ask just one question: What limits the power of the government?

In the U.S.A., there is an entire system of checks and balances. In Israel, we have no constitution, no Senate, no federal structure, and no other check on the power of the central government, except one: the Supreme Court.

Now the government is trying to gain control of the Supreme Court. If it succeeds, there will be no mechanism that limits its power. Coalition members have already proposed numerous laws and regulations that discriminate against Muslims, Christians, women, LGBTQ people and secular people. They are only waiting to take control of the Supreme Court, and then they could unleash this dictatorial flood.

Also, with the Supreme Court neutralized, the government could easily rig the elections – for example, by denying Arab citizens voting rights, or by closing down all independent media outlets. Israel will still hold elections, just as Russia holds elections, but it will become a dictatorship.

This should be a grave concern, not just to Americans who care about democracy or about the Jewish people. The U.S.A. might soon have to deal with a new militaristic dictatorship in the Middle East, armed not only with nuclear capabilities, but also with advanced cyber-weapons able to strike anywhere in the world.

The people of Israel are struggling to save our democracy. Please, stand with us.


## SPEEDY RECOVERY

Signal Fires by Dani Shapiro brought out a big group on July 10: Bertha Bodenheimer, Mitch Ross, Helene Perry, Heather Berube, Judy Abromson, Margaret Meyer and me, Lesli Weiner. This was a thoughtful, well-written novel. The oscillating timeline was a great way to have the reader learn about the characters in a non-linear manner. The story left us thinking about the "what-ifs" of the life decisions made. But also about how those decisions shaped their futures. I'm not going to get more specific than that because we all encourage you to read this book, and anything else by Dani Shapiro.

Our next book was a *New Yorker* Best Book of 2022. Here's what Amazon says about *The Latecomer:* 

From the *New York Times* bestselling author of *The Plot*, Jean Hanff Korelitz's *The Latecomer* is a layered and immersive literary novel about three siblings, desperate to escape one another, and the upending of their family by the late arrival of a fourth.

The Latecomer follows the story of the wealthy, New York City-based Oppenheimer family, from the first meeting of parents Salo and Johanna, under tragic circumstances, to their triplets born during the early days of IVF. As children, the three siblings – Harrison, Lewyn, and Sally – feel no strong familial bond and cannot wait to go their separate ways, even as their father becomes more distanced and their mother more desperate. When the triplets leave for college, Johanna, faced with being truly alone, makes the decision to have a fourth child. What role will the "latecomer" play in this fractured family?

A complex novel that builds slowly and deliberately, *The Latecomer* touches on the topics of grief and guilt, generational trauma, privilege and race, traditions and religion, and family dynamics. It is a profound and witty family story from an accomplished author, known for the depth of her character studies, expertly woven storylines, and plot twists.

## A New Prayer for the State of Israel Alan Eisner, Rockville Maryland

We pray for our beloved Israel, invoking these words from its Declaration of Independence:

Let us pray that these words will continue to guide Israel's leaders and its people; that the Jewish state will be inclusive, promoting the unity and embracing the full, glorious diversity of the Jewish people. Let us never forget that our history teaches us to stand with the oppressed around the world.
