FROM THE RABBI



Recently, on a long drive, I told my family about a Pro-Palestine rally in Dearborn Michigan (home to the largest Muslim population in the US) which took place on April 5th. At the rally, participants began chanting "Death to America." One speaker even extolled the greatness of the virulently anti-American and anti-Israel leader of the Islamic Revolution in Iran, the Ayatollah Khomeini. Needless to say, the October 7th Hamas attacks were similarly extolled. While the hateful "Death to America" chant was not started from the podium and was only chanted a few times, no one

in charge of the rally attempted to stop the chanting. After the rally major Muslim-American organizations as well as the Muslim-American mayor of Dearborn were sharply critical of the chants. Still, it is hard not to feel that an important line was crossed.

What I would like to share with you, however, was Johnny's response. Johnny half-jokingly and half-seriously (and very dryly) responded, "So how are they winning?" referring to the Pro-Palestine camp.

Johnny was incredulous how a movement of Americans that is so openly anti-American seems to have won over much of American public opinion.

I didn't respond to Johnny—he didn't expect a response as his question was largely rhetorical—but I could not get his comment out of my mind. "So how are they winning?" could be asked about so many movements, political leaders and ideologies these days that espouse views so radical that they would almost certainly have been marginalized even just a few years ago. In many ways, "So how are they winning?" encapsulates so much of what is dysfunctional about contemporary society.

When I expressed radical views as a teenager—as young people tend to do—I remember my father o"bm responding that America is a devoutly centrist country and only a centrist politician could ever hope to win an election. How things have changed. We now live in a society where centrism, compromise, and even listening, are seen as the acts of a traitor to whatever social or political cause.

I think about people so far off the mainstream on both the right and the left who now occupy positions of power in the US, Israel and elsewhere—politicians who routinely say things that until very recently would have been regarded as crazy—as dangerous—and I find myself asking Johnny's question: "So how are they winning?"

Eventually day by day, in every way, we have the opportunity to determine our own Harvest. Each of us is a spiritual farmer, planting, tending and growing our deepest desires.

May we all trust our journeys.






